

Q & A FOR COMMON GLBT QUESTIONS:

Q. Where can I get anonymous HIV testing?

- A. Look under Testing on pg. 24 for the State of Illinois AIDS/HIV/STD hotline or Test Positive Aware Network. Test Positive Aware Network located at 5537 N. Broadway offers free anonymous testing on the following days and times:

Tuesday	10am-4pm
Wednesday	10am-4pm
Thursday	2pm-8pm
Friday	10am-3pm

Q. Where can I find counseling for GLBT Domestic Violence?

- A. The Center on Halsted and Howard Brown Health Services (pg. 19) serve the GLBT population and have licensed clinical social workers on staff. Domestic violence between same sex couples follow the same laws as cases involving couples of opposite sexes Please refer to pg. 11 for common domestic violence questions. Q. Is there victim assistance for GLBT crimes and persons of hate crimes?

You can also contact the Chicago Police Department's Hate Crimes Unit (pg. 19) for further information or your GLBT Officer Rios. A hate crime exists when a person commits a crime against another person solely because of the actual or perceived race, color, creed, religion, ancestry, gender, sexual orientation, physical and/or mental disability without any other motivating factors. Please refer to Illinois Statute 720 ILCS 5/12-7.1.

Q. General information about the Pride Parade?

- A. Contact Pride Chicago on pg 19. The Chicago Pride Parade is held on the last Sunday in the month of June. The Parade Route is North on Halsted from Belmont to Grace, South from Grace on Broadway to Diversey and East on Diversey to Canon Dr. The Parade attendance in recent years has been approximately 450,000 people.
